

Turning Old Pumpkins into a Pumpkin Bird Feeder

Before tossing your old pumpkins into the trash, think about using them to make a bird feeder. Birds are so much fun to watch. This fall, with the help of your mom or dad, you can make this quick and easy pumpkin bird feeder.

Supplies Needed:

- Small pumpkin
- Knife
- Spoon
- Two wooden dowels
- Wire or strong twine
- Birdseed


How To Make:

- 1. With help from your mom or dad, cut off the top of the pumpkin using a knife.
- 2. Using a large spoon, scoop out the seeds and pulp.
- 3. Take a dowel and poke into the pumpkin a few inches down from the top edge. Push it straight out through the opposite side of the pumpkin. Repeat with the second dowel rod so it crosses just under the first dowel. See the il-lustration for placement.
- 4. Cut the wire or twine into four equal lengths. Wrap the wire or tie the twine around each of the dowels. Bring the four pieces of wire/twine together above the pumpkin. If using wire, twist strands together to form a hook. If using twine, tie the four loose ends together in a large knot at the top for hanging your feeder.
- 5. Fill your pumpkin with birdseed and hang in your yard. If you want, you can poke several small holes in the bottom of your pumpkin to let the rainwater drain out.

Wrap Eco-Friendly This Holiday Season

Did you know that Americans throw away an additional 5 million tons of trash (25% more than usual) between Thanksgiving and New Year's Eve? Try some of these eco-friendly wrappings and embellishments to help save the environment and add a new element of fun to your gift giving.

- For gifts, use a cloth bag or a bag made from sturdy paper so it can be reused.
- Choose baskets or hatboxes as another reusable container.
- If giving kitchen utensils, put them in an oven mitt or wrap in a kitchen towel.
- Also consider wrapping presents in materials, which would otherwise be thrown away, such as old maps, newspapers, magazine pages, and brown bags.
- Hang jewelry, such as necklaces, bracelets, and earrings, directly on the Christmas tree.
- Use reusable raffia, fabric ribbons and bows, shoestrings, and measuring tapes to tie up your presents.
- Use holly sprigs, pine cones, or fir branches to embellish presents.
